#### 2. Rakhine updates – organisational & general education

**UNICEF** Rakhine reported that out of the schools that they were supporting 70% of students took the exam. However, **LWF** and **Save the Children** reported that none of the children in the TLS which they run sat the exam. To reason for this discrepancy is unclear. To rectify this, ad-hoc exams will be administered by the Government in the last week of April 2014 for those children that missed out on the first round. To facilitate this, partners need to support the State Education Office (SEO) with student lists and potentially provide stationery. The SEO will make arrangements for the exams through the relevant TEOs and head teachers in existing Government school in the camps (e.g. TKP).

**UNICEF** reported that in their discussions with the State Education Director, he mentioned that the SEO had requested MMK 187 million budget to cover the incentives to teachers in IDP camps for the coming school year (up from 44.9 million this year for 101 volunteer teachers). This means they would cover over 400 volunteer teacher salaries this coming year if they get these funds from NPT. Whilst promising news (and would represent a welcome increase in responsibility for the Government in IDP camp education provision and would free implementing organizations' budget for other activities) this is not yet confirmed.

**Save the Children,** as part of their contingency for potential problems over the census period, has pulled many of their Sittwe-based staff back to Yangon. Only a minimal number of core staff will remain during the census period and Thingyan. The reason for this is that with so many staff in Rakhine, evacuating them all in the case of emergency would be difficult.

**CFSI** (Community and Family Services International) – a Philippines organization by origin - attended the Yangon meeting for the first time and reported on their Community Social Services & Education Project (CSSEP) which they have been doing for many years in northern parts of Rakhine State, based out of Maungdaw. CFSI are looking for funding to start working in Kachin.

**UNICEF** and **Plan International** are in discussions over the possibility of Plan taking over the implementation of UNICEF EiE programmes in Rakhine, in the townships of Mimbya, Mrauk-U and Sittwe. Plan are already working further south doing DRR and Education in Thandwe, and now with funding to start IDP camp work in Kyawphyu and Ramree, but they will need to set up in Sittwe to expand their activities to this area.

The current estimations of EiE sector funding in Rakhine per typology was presented, noting that the relatively high coverage of primary-level emergency education masks the shortfall in education support for post-primary age group and for those in remote locations.

#### 2. Kachin EiE organisation key updates

**Shalom** has submitted their full proposal to MEC for their education support to the KIO ED in KCA Kachin for USD 250k. A response to this is expected by 11 April. In the meantime they are continuing their support using USD 170k of funding secured through OCHA's ERF.

**Save the Children** has finally secured through funding for EiE in Kachin also through OCHA's. This grant will be implemented through national partners WPN and KDG and focusing on the boarding schools and ECCDs in Laiza and Majaiyang.

**UNICEF** is progressing with the initiation of the needs assessment for NGCA Kachin – the TOR for recruiting the consultant to lead it will be released shortly. UNICEF are currently developing their State wide plans for Kachin for 2014 (including education)

#### 3. Laiza cross-line trip update (Education)

The trip report following the cross-line mission by the EiE Coordinator to Laiza at the end of February 2014. The trip involved visiting camps and schools (including boarding) meeting the KIO ED and national education partners. The full trip report has been shared with all partners involved in the trip but only a redacted version can be share more widely with the sector at the moment.

The objectives of this first cross-line mission to Laiza, KCA were as follows:

- Meet with the KIO Education Department to better understand their structure, ways of working and their needs (particularly for the proposed KCA education assessment) (See next point)
- 2. Visit some IDP camp schools and boarding houses to get an idea of the situation and challenges faced in both.
- 3. Meet with organizations supporting Education in KCA Kachin to discuss programmes and funding, capacity and coordination needs and ideas for how they can be better supported.

Some key findings and recommendations from the trip were:

- Youth education opportunities in KCA Kachin are very limited, especially for non-IDPs more information on and support for this vulnerable group is needed.
- Higher levels of drop out of older children (middle and high school age) from the boarding schools was reported by the KIO ED and school administrations
- Boarding houses suffered from poor WASH facilities, sleeping areas and limited food
- Efforts at improving coordination between NGCA and GCA and between international and national organisations is needed and in ways sensitive to the needs and limited resource and capacity of the national NGOs

#### 4. Update on Education initiatives in Kachin update - assessment and improving coordination

During the cross-line trip to Laiza, the proposal document (in English and Kachin) was presented to the KIO ED and explained, along with the latest draft (v.4) of the needs assessment tool. They were offered time to read and discuss it (i.e. to resume the meeting at a later date) but declined and instead wanted to discuss and agree next steps immediately. The following was agreed:

- the timeline with data collection starting in the new academic year at the end of June, beginning of July (the rainy season was not considered an obstacle to this);
- the process and stated that they would put their district education officers (DEOs) and their townships education officers (TEOs) at the disposal of the assessment team (with at least 2 weeks of advanced warning ahead of their training);
- the need to shorten the tool for reason of implementation (despite the fact that the KIO ED say they need all of the information requested in the current version 4);



- the language for the tool and database Myanmar language and English for the tool, English language for the database (but with products using the data translated into Myanmar);
- the need to capture information and data from all of KCA Kachin, not just IDPs, and to include boarding houses;
- the need to collect all information again data exists but the KIO ED consider it out-of-date, inaccurate and/or unreliable;
- the need to include other supporting organizations if possible (Metta, KDG, WPN, etc.) i.e. ensure an inclusive assessment (but recognizing that this would impact upon the timeframe);
- the need to focus on qualitative and quantitative aspects including the attitudes of parents, the community and children;
- the need to include a institutional capacity assessment of the KIO system (which Shalom have agreed to support).

One objective of the meeting was to establish how much education information and data already existed and was regularly being collected in KCA Kachin, in order to avoid duplication in the planned assessment. Shalom have been supporting the establishment of and training on an EMIS before the breakdown of the ceasefire, which stalled development of this and much of the data collected for input into this remains on paper only and is now out of date. However, Shalom report that they will still support the processing and recording of this data as it is still of value. Due to the age of much of their data, the KIO ED request that the assessment be used to update all base data sets as well as collecting new information. A related action point is to establish what the KIO ED EMIS data sets currently are and align the assessment tool and data recording sets to this.
