Update on the CWG	G ToR and Cash Preparedness Tools	
CWG ToR : The final version of the CWG ToR, which was reviewed and commented by CWG members and sector/cluster coordinators, was shared with members in advance of the meeting. The group was informed that this ToR can be reviewed/amended every six months, if necessary. It was also highlighted that Yangon CWG will be working closely with sub-national CWG in Myitkyina and Sittwe as well as the regional CWG. Cash Emergency Preparedness Tools : The small group on updating cash preparedness tools met on 26 May to discuss and amend the existing feasibility checklist, SOPs and Minimum Expenditure basket (MEB). explore opportunities to contribute to more sustainable approaches. It was also noted that a number of the new initiatives were built on existing programmes, reducing start-up costs. The lack of a government system for registration of recipients of cash support was noted as a challenge.

WHH enquired about the CWG's approach on monitoring mechanism of cash programming. It was recognized that obtaining data and designing indicators on outcomes and effectiveness were challenging, particularly in relation to multi-use cash, but that this will be addressed through the CWG workplan.

MRCS asked about cash programming in urban communities (e.g. Yangon and Mandalay) since there are places with hunger problems. It was noted that this will be addressed as part of the GAD cash transfers programme.

OCHA sought the clarity on the figures (number of IDPs) to be used for planned cash assistance for IDPs, since there appear to be a number of discrepancies between the government (MoSWRR) figures and those in the HRP. WFP replied that they did comparison between the different lists and have usually been able to use the higher figures as a basis for assistance.

MRCS updated that they are aiming to scale up support to women-headed households, with cash grants (200,000 – 300,000 Kyats) based on the market assessment results through mobile transfers. MRCS will work together with WFP to define the target areas and population. They are also updating/finalizing SOP with financial services provider (AYA Bank).

CARE informed the group that they are providing cash support (such as hostel fee, meals) to most vulnerable migrant workers who are losing jobs and income from some townships in Yangon.

SCI proposed to share agencies' post-distribution monitoring (PDM) data with CWG members. WFP undertook to share PDM results from Kachin, Shan and Rakhine camps last year.

Agency updates

WFP's mVAM markets monitor report: WFP is carrying out remote market surveys in light of COVID-19 and the results will be shared monthly. WFP is also carrying out regular market monitoring and the results can be uploaded on the MIMU website. However, WFP surveys mainly focus on food items and it was recognized that there are gaps in data on prices for non-food items and services such as health, education. WFP suggested to expand the minimum expenditure basket in the CWG workplan, to provide a basis for more decision making on unrestricted/multi-purpose cash.

WHH stated that they are currently designing a program together with the Department of Agriculture (DOA) and collecting information on beneficiary preferences. An update can be shared at the next CWG meeting.

SCI is working on a program focused on garment industry workers who lost their jobs and collecting income data. This will be expanded to another affected sectors in next month and the full data can be shared by end of July.

Revised 4W data collection

A revised, more focused 4W matrix was shared with CWG members for inputs. About 15 organizations have provided data and Mercy Corps (CWG co-chair) will be working together with OCHA (CWG secretariat) to consolidate the information. Those organization who have yet to respond are requested to do so.

WFP sought the clarification on the "amount" column in the template (whether total amount of the whole project or ration size) and suggested to standardize the currency as well. Some of the members recommended to use Myanmar Kyats as a standard. It was also suggested to use P-code while providing information. It was noted that 4W data collection will be on ongoing process.
