| 3   | Updates on the on the<br>Agriculture Sector (Crop,<br>livestock and fisheries) DRR<br>(AAPDRR) planning process<br>by FAO | <ul> <li>The Agriculture Action Plan for DRR (AAPDRR) is the action plan defining DRR priorities related to the agriculture sector, being under formulation by MOALI with technical support of FAO.</li> <li>It is completely aligned with the MAPDRR and the starting point for its development has been those priority actions, included in the MAPDRR, that are related to the agriculture sector.</li> <li>The first step to develop the AAPDRR is the revision not only of MAPDRR but also of the Myanmar Climate Change Strategy and Action Plan, the Myanmar Climate Smart Agriculture Strategy and the Community Disaster Resilience Framework.</li> <li>The stakeholder consultation process included 6 steps: <ol> <li>Brainstorming Workshop (MOALI)</li> <li>Department Level Consultation (MOALI)</li> <li>Reaching Out Stakeholder Consultation Workshop</li> <li>Final Review and Validation Workshop (MOALI)</li> <li>Endorsement for Approval</li> </ol> </li> <li>Main feature of the AAPDRR: <ol> <li>it will cover 5 years;</li> <li>it will include DRR/DRM actions and also short-term CCA/CSA</li> </ol> </li> </ul> |               |

interventions, and

- it will be lined up with MAPDRR-SFDRR structure.
- The key thematic areas identified along with the action of the MAPDRR/SFDRR framework are:
  - -SFDRR 1/MAPDRR 1. Assessing Disaster Risk including extreme weather events and creating public awareness on DRR in Myanmar: Risk and Vulnerability Assessment and Analyses; Drought Risk and Vulnerability Assessment; Risk and Vulnerability Assessment in context of Climate Change; Multihazard and Risk Mapping; Public Awareness Raising and Education
  - -SFDRR 2/ MAPDRR 2. Strengthening disaster risk governance to reduce and manage risk: Implementation structures for DRR in AG; DRR Planning: Horizontal and Vertical Integration (Subsector and Regional/State-Township-Village); Integration of DRR and CCA/CSA; Local planning and CBDRM; Regulatory mechanisms (linked to operations) and policies; Promoting Agriculture-related Insurance and Access to Credit for DRR; Partnerships; Land use Planning for enhanced DRR
  - -SFDRR 3/ MAPDRR 3. Mainstreaming disaster risk reduction for resilient development in Myanmar:\_Promotion of Hazard Proof Technologies and CSA Practices (Crops, Livestock and Fisheries); Agriculture infrastructure for DRR; Community-based DRR and CCA; Natural resource management for DRR in agriculture; Integrated capacity development for CBDRR
  - -SFDRR 4/ MAPDRR 4. Enhancing disaster preparedness for effective response and resilient rehabilitation and reconstruction in Myanmar: Early Warning/ Early Warning Early Action/Dissemination and Operational Monitoring Support; Disaster/Emergency Preparedness and Contingency Planning; Damage and Loss Monitoring and Inputs Assessment; Emergency Response, Rehabilitation, and Building Back Better
- Aligning the AAPDRR to the MAPDRR, presents some challenges:
  - In the MAPDRR, MOALI is leading agency only for four priority actions, there are other relevant activities for MOALI not captured;
  - The priority actions related to the agriculture sector in the MAPDRR

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| 4 | Sharing about earthquake tabletop exercise by ActionAid               | • | On 15 <sup>th</sup> November 2017, Action Aid organized a tabletop exercise for the Yangon DM Committee  The main objective of the exercise was to introduce participants to the Incident Command System (ICS) and international standards for Emergency Operations Centers (EOCs). By conducting 4 exercises, the participants could identify/organize Emergency Support Functions (ESF) representatives and EOC staff, build a Situation Report (SitRep), create an Incident Action Plan (IAP), identify IAP priorities  The scenario developed was a M 7.4 earthquake along segment 5 (Mottama Gulf Segment) of Sagaing Fault  Despite it was an important exercise, some department did not understand their role and responsibilities in Regional Disaster Management Committee. For example, it was hard to define the EOC director.  This exercise can be used in the future for preparing contingency plans.   | There can be collaboration in the future with UNDP that is working on earthquake preparedness |
| 5 | Sharing about SIMEX for earthquake scenario at national level by OCHA | • | A simulation exercise (simex), organized by OCHA and RRD and with support from UNDP, will be organized in the end of January 2018.  The main objective of the simex will be to test the readiness of the NDMC and of the Working Committees to respond to a big disaster and to improve coordination.  The scenario for this simulation exercise will be a massive earthquake in Mandalay region to be managed at national level and requiring intervention from international actors. It will be a two days exercise.  It will be a government exercise. There will be 2-3 seats for DRRWG members, as observers.  Since there are not SOPs to be tested during the exercise, UNDP, in coordination with OCHA, is supporting RRD in formulating list of actions that the different DM working committee will have to carry out in order to effectively respond to a disaster. The simex will be an occasion to test these SOPs.  The developed SOPs will contribute to the further development of the DRM |   |
