Presentation of recent SAM admission trend + discussion	<ul> <li>In the most severe humanitarian crises, older children and adults are likely to be affected, as well as infants and young children (GAM higher than 20% in Maungdaw/ 8% in Sittwe/ 11% in Pauktaw).</li> <li>No major change/shock has been observed in the nutrition security of the townships concerned in these first six month of the year.</li> <li>The switch of admission criteria (WHO standard) is the main reason for such increase of children above 59 months years old.</li> <li>Flooding in Rakhine State in June/July will impact on agricultural output with a likely deterioration of nutritional status of the entire population before the end of the year.</li> <li>Taking into consideration the high level of GAM and SAM, the inclusion of children above 59 months in nutrition program is needed and should be considered as a life-saving humanitarian intervention.</li> </ul>	Partners agree that there is a need to treat SAM children >59 months. Follow up discussion should take place before discussion/meeting with NNC.
AoB	<ul> <li>UNICEF and WFP submitted a combined CERF proposal for SAM and MAM treatment in northern Rakhine State.</li> <li>Malteser and SCI submitted ERF proposals.</li> <li>A second draft nutrition guide/strategy will be shared with partners for inputs in the coming weeks.</li> <li>Partners agreed on the need to have a positioning paper related to the response to the recent flooding/landslides. The floods/landslides will likely have a long term impact on nutrition security of vulnerable populations. A draft will be shared with partners for input.</li> </ul>
