

1. Overview

- The Logistics Cluster was activated on 5 April 2025 – three Logistics Cluster staff members have been deployed to Myanmar to facilitate coordination and operational setup.
- The survey conducted to assess partners logistics capacities, needs and challenges ([Rapid Gaps and Needs Analysis findings](#)) indicates priority gaps in storage and transport services, coordination support, and clarity on importation procedures and regulations.
- On the basis of those findings and continuous assessments on the ground, the Logistics Cluster Concept of Operations (ConOps) is being developed and will be presented to partners.

2. Coordination & Information Management

- The next coordination meeting is scheduled for **Friday, 11 April 2025 at 2PM Yangon time (GMT +06:30)**.

- It has been reported that the Customs Department will ensure smooth operations during the holiday period. Customs clearance for air and sea routes will be expedited on 12/04, 15/04 and 19/04, with overtime services available if needed. For further information please visit our [website](#).
- The Logistics Cluster is coordinating with the Health Cluster and World Health Organization (WHO) to explore tailored support for medical logistics.

3. Logistics Updates

Overland transport

- Transport of relief supplies into Sagaing via the new Ayarwaddy Bridge, which has minor damage, is being done using smaller vehicles due to weight limits. This results in a 3-4 hour wait for each truck to cross the bridge, significantly slowing down the overall delivery of relief items.
- The highway between Yangon and Mandalay has uneven road sections, especially near small bridges and between milepost 160-180.
- Transport between Myitkyina and Mandalay was reported possible and took approximately 48 hours.

Air

- Yangon Airport (RGN): Open with limited payload and handling capacity. Department of Civil Aviation granted a weight limit waiver (50MT) due to refuelling limitations in Yangon.
- Nay Pyi Taw Airport (NYT): relief flights and domestic passenger flights are operating, and only during daytime.
- Mandalay Airport (MDL): Small aircraft (ATRs) and domestic passenger flights are operating. 10,000 feet of the runway rebuilt.

Airlift

- EUHAB flight to Yangon on 9 April went smoothly. ECHO is securing 4-5 flights to operate between 11-15 April (four flights from Kuala Lumpur UNHRD and one from Liege, into Yangon).

Storage

- A common warehouse in Mandalay is being secured to support humanitarian cargo storage.
- WFP looking into allocating dedicated space for interagency cargo in their Yangon warehouse to receive and consolidate items arriving at the Yangon airport.
- Storage space in Sagaing is limited and raining has imposed additional challenges. However, the exact requirements and opportunities remain unclear at this stage due to access constraints.
